WHAT IS POLITICAL ECOLOGY? LESSONS FROM THE TREE OF HEAVEN

Political ecology posits that environmental issues are always sites of social contention and struggle. Using the example of the "invasive" Tree of Heaven (Ailanthus altissima), we'll explore who wins and who loses, and what social injustices are corrected or intensified, when species and environments are managed in particular ways.

Americans are famous for their geographical ignorance, which has serious implications for citizenship and global understanding. How did this come about? And what can be done to ensure that future generations are more spatially literate?

THE STRANGE CASE OF COCA, A BIOGEOGRAPHICAL MYSTER

Cocaine is a drug in global demand. Yet the raw ingredient for cocaine, the coca plant (Erythroxylum spp)—is only grown in South America. This makes coca unique among lucrative—and widespread—illicit drug crops. What's behind coca's unique biogeography, and what's at stake if it spreads beyond South America?
